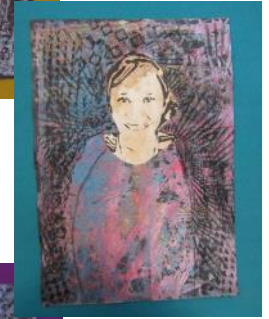
THANK YOU ALL FOR SIGNING IN AND OUT LATE ARRIVALS / EARLY PICK-UPS.

Visual Art 2018

Students are learning to use everyday objects in their artmaking. A box lid, some marbles and metallic paint, provided them with a stimulating, multisensory experience while developing their sensory and manipulative skills. When dried, students used the marbled paper to make korowai portraits by adding crayon rubbings for background detail.

Senior students explored the art element of colour through the sense of touch, vision and sound. They created painted paper in shades of red, developing their vocabulary of colour names like crimson, vermillion and burgundy.
